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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dasmesh Girls College, Chak Alla Baksh, Mukerian, is situated on the outskirts of Mukerian in District Hoshiarpur, Punjab. It is an unaided institute only for girls affiliated with Panjab University, Chandigarh. The college is managed by the Local Management Committee named Sri Guru Gobind Singh Educational Ch. Trust (Regd.), which is under the Societies Registration Act (XXI of 1860) and as amended by the Punjab Amendment Act 1957. The college was established in 2001 and got affiliation in 2006 from Panjab University, Chandigarh and is recognized by University Grants Commission (UGC) under act 2(f) and 12(B). The college has a proud status of NAAC accreditation with “A” grade in First cycle in 2016. Disseminating the philosophy of Guru Gobind Singh, ‘**Shubh Karman te Kabhun na Tarun**’ (May I never refrain from the righteous acts), the college has a strong commitment to excel so that the students grow up to be fine human beings and are able to assume a positive and fulfilling role in nation building.

With the efforts of a dedicated Governing Council, a highly qualified and experienced Faculty, the college has achieved many milestones by grabbing top most university positions, nearly 100% results in University exams and many students standing in University merit list, winning numerous accolades in Panjab University- Zonal/ Inter-zonal Youth and heritage festivals, and Sports competitions.

Some of the faculties are members of the Board of Studies at Panjab University, Chandigarh and help to bring about required changes in curriculum from time to time.

- ? Teaching, learning, and evaluation are integral part of the academic activities of the college. Institution offers a broad spectrum of programmes and courses.
- ? The information regarding admission is shared in the Public domain through College website, prospectus, local newspapers, the distribution of pamphlets, and display of holdings/banners at different places.
- ? Admission Committee, Career Guidance and Placement cell are working for one to one Counseling during admission.
- ? Students are admitted on the merit basis in professional Courses respectively like BBA, BCA, BCOM, BSC (NM & Medical), BA.BED (4 year Integrated Course) and PG Courses. In BA, students are admitted on the first come first- serve basis.

? In order to provide equal opportunity to the students belonging to SC, ST, OBC scholarship is provided by the College according to guidelines of the government. Apart of this College provide financial aid to father less, parents less, meritorious, economical weak and sports students etc.

? Panjab University academic calendar is strictly adhered to teaching, learning and evaluation schedule.

? In order to evaluate the teaching-- learning process, regular class tests, house tests, Viva-voce, regular assignments, presentations for seamless continuous Internal Assessment for final examination being conducted by the institution under the guidelines of Panjab University, Chandigarh.

? Student centric, participatory and interactive learning process through class participation, group discussion, presentations, role plays and many more. In order to nurture the critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students, students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities like quiz, Essay writing, Debate, Elocution, Exhibitions etc.

? In order to complement the teaching learning process, library has a rich collection of books and Journals, OPAC (Online Public Access Catalog); and access of INFBLIBNET, N-LIST available and Wi-Fi facility in the library.

? Resource Persons are invited to deliver extension lectures to keep teachers and students in touch with the latest techniques.

? Bridging the gap between slow learners and advanced learners met through specific counseling and extra efforts.

? Highly qualified and competent faculty with all faculty positions are filled as per the norms lay down by Panjab University, Chandigarh and UGC etc.

? Faculty is encouraged for pursuing PhD taking up research projects, attending orientation Programs and refresher courses with duty leave and financial assistance for the same.

? The results of the College have been quite excellent. In order to make the students aware of practical aspects of the industry, regular industrial visits are conducted every year.

Research, Innovations and Extension

? College has established a 'Research and Development Cell' consisting of the faculty members that is responsible for organizing seminars, workshops, and extension lectures from time to time.

? 53Workshops/ Seminars/ on Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights (IPA) and entrepreneurship were conducted, as part of intricate research, faculty members have published 6 books, 47 Research Papers in UGC listed journals, 69 chapters in Books, during current assessment period. College has received 12 awards/ appreciation and recognition for organizing extension activities from Government and non-government recognized bodies.

? The NSS, NCC, Women Cell and the departments are involved in extension activities. During the covid pandemic, the college created an awareness campaign among the people of the locality.

? Seventy Nine extension and outreach programs were organized through NSS /NCC/RRC. Extension activities organized in the neighborhood community sensitizing students to social issues, moral ethics and cultural awareness etc. Unnat Bharat Abhiyan cell has adopted 3 villages' surroundings areas.

? Faculty and student exchange programme has been undertaken in the last five years. Field trips are a regular feature of the departments every year. Field trips are encouraged to strengthen experiential learning.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

? The college total area is 24281 square meters. The college covered area is 9439.8 square meters. The college has 46 well-furnished classrooms for conduction theory classes, a common staff room with basic amenities and facilities, 20 labs. The whole campus of the college is connected to Wi-Fi.

? The college has an ICT enabled multipurpose hall and one conference room for conducting seminars, workshops, extension lectures and staff meetings.

? The IQAC Room, NSS room, Examination room, Sports room, and department wise staff rooms are available in the college.

? To develop and enhance the scientific temperament among students, the college has set up well equipped Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Psychology, Computer, Language and Math labs under the lab attendant to perform their practical knowledge. All labs' tools, devices, gadgets, apparatus, gears, and appliances are maintained by lab attendants for maximum utilization.

? To develop reading habits among students, a well-equipped and well- maintained Wi-Fi library, one reading room for disabled students is available on the ground floor. In the library, library management software, barcode technology and E-resources are available.

? College also provides transport facilities to the students residing in rural areas and a faculty house is also available for the distant faculty.

? In addition the college has a Vermi Compost Pit, Botanical garden, 3 LCD, clean drinking water with R-O system, a visitor room, Health Centre, Record Room etc.

? The institution gives utmost importance to the overall development of the students and organizes various cultural activities, sports and games on campus, offering the following facilities. The college has outdoor and indoor sports facilities equipped with modern gadgets. College has two large playgrounds with provision for Athletics, Badminton, Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, Gatka, Karate and for others cultural events. Athletic Meet is celebrated every year in the institution.

Student Support and Progression

? Multiple students have been benefited by scholarships, free ships etc. provided by the institution / non-government /government/Panjab University every year.

? Capacity building and skills enhancement initiatives taken by the institution include the following: Soft skills Language and communication skills, Life skills (Yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene) ICT/computing skills.

? The Institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases Implementation of guidelines of statutory/regulatory bodies' organization wide awareness and undertakings on policies with zero tolerance. Mechanism for submission of online/offline students' grievances timely redressed of the grievances through appropriate committees.

? Institute puts efforts for the all-round development of a student. It contributes to educational spirit and community welfare. That's why the Students' Council is elected to represent the voice of the student community. Students are the most important stakeholders in education and Student Council is constituted to ensure democratization of management and their effective participation in decision making by continuous interaction among themselves and the college administration.

? Student Council comprises Head Girl, Vice Head Girl, Class representatives and Vice class representatives. Students are encouraged to develop action plans for organizing various functions in the institution and to engrain democratic principles in its functioning. To develop organizational and managerial skills in students, many functions and farewell parties are managed by the Student Council.

? Alumni committee in collaboration with Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat and Department of Visual Performing Arts organized various competitions like rangoli, solo folk song competition and tie and dye competition.

In the beginning of the session, an academic calendar of Institution is prepared in which all the curricular and co-curricular activities of the institution are enlisted sequence wise, so as to make the students aware of the academic and other activities schedule. In addition to this, students are provided details of the curriculum planning of the courses being taught that includes the schedule of coverage of the syllabus in the term evaluation and assessment system and other related information. This curriculum delivery blueprint is given both online as well as offline and / or by the department and the teacher individually using social media like whatsapp, through personal interaction in the classrooms and is also displayed on the notice boards. The quantum of syllabus to be covered in a specified time slot is finalized in the faculty meetings of the department. Similarly, the extent of syllabus coverage is regularly monitored by the Heads of the respective departments and discussed in the meetings of the department (Two to Three meetings per semester scheduled by department) . Students are provides with a list of books and resources which they can consult for better understanding of the topics. Time table pertaining to classes is also displayed on the notice board before the commencement of the session. Academic activities are planned and scheduled in advance and are organized accordingly as much as possible. Students are informed in advance about their seminars and workshops and the information regarding this is displayed on notice boards. Information regarding tutorial classes, Remedial classes, unit tests, house tests, class quiz, and PG classes seminars and their topics is also displayed on the notice boards. Field visits and trainings are organized for the courses with such provisions in the curriculum. In courses with projects works , due guidance is provided to the students. This ensures an unhindered teaching –learning – evaluation assessment process beyond the college hours. Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The college has transparent and robust evaluation process in terms of frequency and variety. In order to ensure transparency in internal assessment, the system of internal assessment is communicated to the students well in time through Prospectus as well as announcements in the classrooms are made and displayed the date sheet of the exams on the Notice Board. The Principal hold meetings of the faculties and directs them to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation process. At the entry level, admissions are given purely on merit basis. Students who are admitted for the concerned course are assessed continuously through various evaluation processes at the college and University level. House examinations are conducted regularly as per the schedule given in Academic Calendar. The performance of the students is communicated to the students.

Evaluation of Semester examinations is done at the evaluation center set up by the University. The University appoint teachers for the spot evaluation of answer books at the marking center within a given time.

The external examination assessment for the viva –voce and practical subject is conducted by an internal examiner and an external examiner is appointed from the other colleges as decided by the University.

Assessment is done through one or more than one processes, carried out by the departments that identify, collect, and prepare data to evaluate the achievement of course outcomes (CO's) and programme outcomes (POs). The process for finding the attainment of Course outcomes and programme outcomes (POs) uses various tools/methods.

Students' knowledge and skills are measured directly from their performance in the class through assignment, internal assessment tests, semester examinations, seminars, laboratory assignments/practicals, mini projects etc. These methods provide a sampling of what students know and/or can do and provide strong evidence of student learning.

Rubrics are used for both formative and summative assessment of students. Same rubric is used for assessing an outcome so that the faculty is able to assess student progress and maintain the record of the same for each student. The rubrics are shared with students before being evaluated so that they are aware of the performance criteria and their weightage.

Methods of Measuring Attainment:

- 1. University Examinations:** The affiliating university conducts semester-end examinations for all the courses. Through these university exams, programme outcomes are measured by the Institution based on the course attainment level fixed for the programme. It's a direct evaluation process.
- 2. Internal & External Assessment:** Internal examinations are conducted by the Institution. Internal assignments, student seminars, and other student-centered academic activities are mostly aligned with the programme outcomes of the subject concerned. External assessment is done for practical exams through viva voce and practical files by the subject experts appointed by the affiliating university.
- 3. Internships/Project work:** Students are motivated to take up project work and internships, and students' attainment of course outcomes in the respective course is measured, based on their project report and performance in viva voce. Assessment in the internships is carried out by the respective organizations or institutions, and only if the student's performance meets the attainment level fixed by them, he/she will be awarded internship completion certificates.
- 4.** An important programme outcome for an under-graduate student is placement upon the completion of the programme. The Institution has an established placement cell which focuses on skill enhancement training through certificate courses in four important areas and organizes placement drives on and off campus.
- 5. Higher Studies:** Another important programme outcome for an under-graduate student and post graduate students is higher education. The departments offer coaching and guidance to the students and encourage the students to seek higher education in the respective subjects.

Dasmesh Girls College, Chak Alla Baksh, Mukerian, is a self-financed institution work under the able counselling and management of Sri Guru Gobind Singh Educational Charitable Trust. The College offers different facilities of physical infrastructure, sports and cultural activities.

- College has 46 well-furnished classrooms for conduction theory classes and 20 Labs . Whole campus of the college has connected with Wi-Fi.
- The college has ICT enabled Multipurpose Hall and Conference Room for conducting seminars, workshops, extension lectures and staff meetings. The college has 5 LCD and 4 projector rooms.
- The IQAC room, sports room, and department wise staff rooms are available in the college.
- To develop and enhance the scientific temperament among students the college has setup well equipped Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Computer labs under the lab attendant to maintain its equipments, tools, devices, gadgets, apparatus, gears and appliances. Apart of this the college has Psychology, Math, Language and ICT labs to enhance the practical knowledge of students.
- To develop the reading habits among students a well-equipped, well-maintained, Air-conditioner and Wi-Fi library is available for the users. In the Library, Library Management Software, bar code technology, databases are used.
- College also provides transport facilities to the students residing in rural areas.
- In addition, college have clean drinking water with R-O system, Health Centre, Record Room, Strong Room etc.
- The college has outdoor and indoor sports facilities equipped with modern gadgets. The indoor sports include chess, carom etc. College has two big playgrounds with provision for Athletics, Badminton, Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, Gatka and Krate. Athletic Meet is celebrated every year in the institution. The college give fee concession to sports students to encourage them to participate in Inter and Intra college sports competitions.
- For the preparation of different competitions, different coaches are appointed for games and also give smart tracksuits and healthy refreshment to the athletes.
- A sophisticated Indoor-Outdoor gymnasium and yoga facilitates has provided by the college for students to develop their physical strength and fitness.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

In our library named Bhai Gurdas Library, we always try to provide our students and faculty with latest books, journals and magazines, e-books, e-journals through e-resources, Book Bank facility, OPAC section etc.

Bibliosoft: The book collection is updated in the library software and the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is available to students and faculty members. The management and control of the library of our college assisted by Bibliosoft, version 3.00.001, an integrated library automation software produced by Macwill Information System. This system efficiently meets the requirements of the library. Bibliosoft comprises modules required for day-to-day transaction and house-keeping functions of the library. The status of any book can check and if the book is issued, librarian can know the details of the borrower through inquiry module. The library is fully computerized with the barcode scanner-based issue and return process. And the library works with manual process also.

OPAC- The library has developed its own collection databases through library software. Online Public access Catalogue (OPAC) facility has been provided in library. OPAC is widely used by students and faculty members to search books by title, author, subject name, publisher, ISBN, accession number, etc.

E-Resources- The library is a member of the Delnet and N-List consortia of the Information Library Network (INFLIBNET).

INFLIBNET- Library has a membership of INFLIBNET. It helps teachers and students to access 6000+ e-journals and 31, 35,000+ e-books on N-LIST by INFLIBNET. The username and password were issued to every teacher and students of all disciplines. They can access this facility from anywhere by using the internet. This is used by students with login password.

DELNET Library also has DELNET (Developing Library Network) membership. The main objectives of DELNET are to promote resource sharing among member libraries by collecting, storing and disseminating information by offering networking services to users.

Reprographic Service: Reprographics facility also provided to the students and faculty members.

Computer Section: Library have 3 computers one for server, one for circulation of books and one for public access. The institution has a database like delnet, Nlist, open online Shodhganga. These sources are used by the users to open the e-journals, e-books according to their need. **Books:** Books are present in library with barcode. Books are purchased by the librarian according to needs of the users with the help of library advisory committee. Books are donated to the library by faculty members for student use. Annual stock taking is carried out to identify the books in need of repair/rebinding.

Response:

The development of IT infrastructure is given top priority as the college realizes the correlation between adequate infrastructure and effective teaching-learning. The strategies adopted for ensuring adequate IT infrastructure are as follows:

- At the beginning of each academic year assessment is carried out for replacement/upgradation/addition of the existing IT infrastructure based on the suggestions from heads of department, lab technicians and system Administrator after the review of course requirements, budget constraints, working condition of the existing equipment and student's grievances.
- Optimal deployment of IT infrastructure is ensured by conducting workshops/awareness programs/training programs for the faculty which helps them in using the new technology.
- Effective utilization of IT infrastructure is ensured through appointment of adequate and well qualified lab technicians/system administrator.
- Maintenance of deployed software applications, UPS, mouse, keypad, monitors etc. is performed at the beginning of each academic year. The institute has always been reviewing the current needs and the Internet bandwidth is upgraded from time to time accordingly.
- Each department has been given access to its own computer according to the requirements. There are total 84 computers in the college but 70 computers are used by the student, others are used by different departments and administrative staff.
- Wi-Fi Plan which we are currently using FIBRE_PREMIUM_PLUS/ up to 200 Mbps till 3300 GB, up to 15 Mbps beyond/unlimited Calls.
- The Internet Service Provider (ISP) BSNL provides connectivity with high fault tolerance.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The College follows a steady and consistent system of auditing. Audit is an exercise to ensure that all procedures designed for making the payments are duly followed keeping in view the guidelines issued by the concerned competent authorities. Institute maintains finance and accounts systematically. Ledger accounts, Cash Book and Trail Balance sheets are prepared to manage the finance. The scope of the internal audit programme encompassed working of various compliance under appropriate laws and rules and regulations framed under the sufficient systems and procedures are in place for adherence of institutional policies, physical verification of assets, proper books of accounts, vouchers along with supporting documents are maintained, confirmation of balances from debtors, creditors and other parties are obtained periodically at the year end. For External auditing, there is a CA appointed to do the required handling regarding financial management and resource mobilization. The institute also ensures timely submission of audited utilization certificate to various funding agencies. A report is submitted to the Principal from the audit section after complete verification. This audit process is carried out by the professionally qualified and competent chartered accountant. For every account transaction, the account section of the institution properly maintains the cash books, ledgers. After careful verification, each bill is passed.

Institution has a transparent and well planned financial management system. The funds are mobilized by the Institute through fees (tuition, transportation etc.) by the students who are admitted as per regulations governed by Panjab University Chandigarh. The other sources of funds are through the internal revenue that is the bank interest. A report of sanctioned budget and actual expenses are periodically maintained according to the guidelines specified by the Management and Principal. Funds are provided to meet the infrastructure requirement of the institution while starting new programmes. The extracurricular activities
